A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Ottawa Food Bank was established in 1984, and although we are very proud of the work we do, we wish our programs weren't needed. But, if we didn't exist, I can't imagine what would happen to the people who turn to a food bank every month. Until there comes a day when poverty does not exist in our community, the Ottawa Food Bank will be there for whoever needs us.

People turning to the Ottawa Food Bank are diverse and the reasons they come are just as varied. Our inaugural *Ottawa Hunger Report, The Invisible Face of Hunger*, released in December of 2016, reported that 41,540 people turn to a food bank every month and that the issue of hunger is growing in complexity. We know that "throwing" more food at the problem does not fix the issue of hunger in Ottawa. I see the solution of hunger in three pillars.

The first pillar is to do "food banking better". There is a clear, proven link between our mental and physical health and the food we eat. The most vulnerable to a health crisis are people that can't purchase enough food or don't have access to nutritious food. The Ottawa Food Bank has focused its efforts over the last year to provide more nutritious and fresh food through a number of new initiatives shared in this report. Thanks to your support, 45% of the food the Ottawa Food Bank distributes today is fresh. I would like to see this grow to 60% by 2020.

The second pillar is using our collective voice to address the systemic changes needed to reduce poverty and hunger. 65% of the people who turn to the Ottawa Food Bank every month receive social assistance and simply do not receive enough support to make ends meet.

We have a responsibility to use our united voice to effect change. Working with you and all our partners, at all levels, we can drive change to address the root issues of hunger in our community. I would like to see a reduction in chronic food bank usage by increasing access to resources and additional supports.

The third pillar needed to end hunger in our city is YOU. Donors, volunteers and partners. When we work together, we have a profound impact on the most vulnerable in our community. You ensure nutritious food is available in times of need. You ensure the seeds are planted at the farm; the food is sorted and delivered to the community programs. You can speak for those who are voiceless. You make everything possible. I want to make sure you know how valued and important you are to this community. Thank you.

The coming year is full of unknowns and challenges but I remain hopeful. The Ottawa Food Bank has the incredible support of donors, agencies, politicians, and advocates who are committed to changing our community and ensuring everyone has access to nutritious food. We are honoured to work with you. Together, we can end hunger in Ottawa.

PROGRAMS

Because of you, every glass of milk, every bowl of lentils, and every apple is there for those who need it. Your gift provides food for 41,540 people every month in Ottawa. We work with 112 community partners who are the experts in serving their communities. Whether it is meeting specific dietary needs, helping new Canadians by providing culturally appropriate food, or providing diapers and formula for young parents, the staff and volunteers provide food with dignity and care.

ESSENTIAL SERVICE Your donation guarantees certain items that are essential for meals and healthy eating, such as tuna, beans, lentils, and vegetables. We promise to have these items and budget \$1.4 million to ensure these essentials are always available.

Our new **Health Smart Program** will ensure all our guaranteed items will be of the highest nutritional standard. We worked with Ottawa Public Health to determine which specific brands to buy to ensure the best nutritional value. We are confident this move to healthier items will have a great effect on our community.



GOOD FOOD MATTERS The Ottawa Food Bank believes that providing good food is crucial to the wellbeing of our community. In 2015-2016, you ensured that 45% of the food provided by the Ottawa Food Bank was fresh food. This included 30,240 lbs. of halal ground beef purchased through the **Food Aid Program** and 1,358 cases of chicken donated through the **Chicken Farmers of Canada**. Your gift also provides thousands of pounds of fresh produce including 90,000 lbs. of vegetables and fruits grown at our farm in Stittsville, as part of our **Community Harvest Program**.

The Ottawa Food Bank has eight acres of donated farm land and since 2010, with the help of hundreds of volunteers, we have grown vegetables like peppers, tomatoes, carrots, potatoes, and squash. In the fall of 2015, we worked with our agency partners to identify what vegetables were



most in demand. Based on that feedback, we cut back on less popular vegetables like kale and added in some fruits like watermelons and cantaloupe. Combined with the vegetables and fruits purchased and donated we were able to deliver 134,316 lbs. of produce into the community. The Ottawa Food Bank has been recovering food in the Ottawa community for almost 20 years. We work with local restaurants, hotels, and hospitality partners to recover meals that are delivered directly to agencies. We also work with grocery store partners, including Wal-Mart and Metro, to recover dry and fresh goods. This provides quality food to those who need it and reduces food waste in our community.

KIDS MATTER TOO About 36% of Ottawa Food Bank clients are under the age of 18. In 2015-2016, we provided 76,000 healthy snacks to 23 **KickStart After 4 Programs**. Several of these programs provide cooking classes using our ingredients, helping the next generation develop crucial life skills in the kitchen.

In the summer months, school meal programs and our snack program close down. That means an additional burden for families. The Ottawa Food Bank's **Summer Lunch Program** provided healthy lunches to 18 summer day camps. With help from Sodexo's *Feeding our Future Program*, over a 7-week period, 11,089 sandwiches, juice boxes, and fruits were handed out to 652 children.



PROVIDING FOR STRUGGLING PARENTS AND BABY

Your support supplies diapers, formula, and baby food to 67 agencies. Helping struggling parents and their babies is a crucial service that faced challenges this year. Soaring prices and increased demand meant we could not keep up with requests. In fact, baby items were our only product category that saw a price increase for every single item. We purchased \$110,803 worth of baby food and supplies, including 1,889 cases of baby formula, and 3,777 cases of diapers. Yet we still could not keep up with demand. In 2017, thanks to your support, the Ottawa Food Bank is increasing the budget of the **Baby Basics Program** to meet the need.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION: FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016

The Ottawa Food Bank fights hunger by collecting and purchasing millions of pounds of food each year. This food is generously donated by the public and food industry partners through community food drives, events, and our Red Cage Program which collects food donations at local grocery stores. Financial donations allow the Ottawa Food Bank to make up for any shortfall in food donations as well as purchase nutritious perishable items such as eggs, yogurt, fresh fruits, and vegetables.

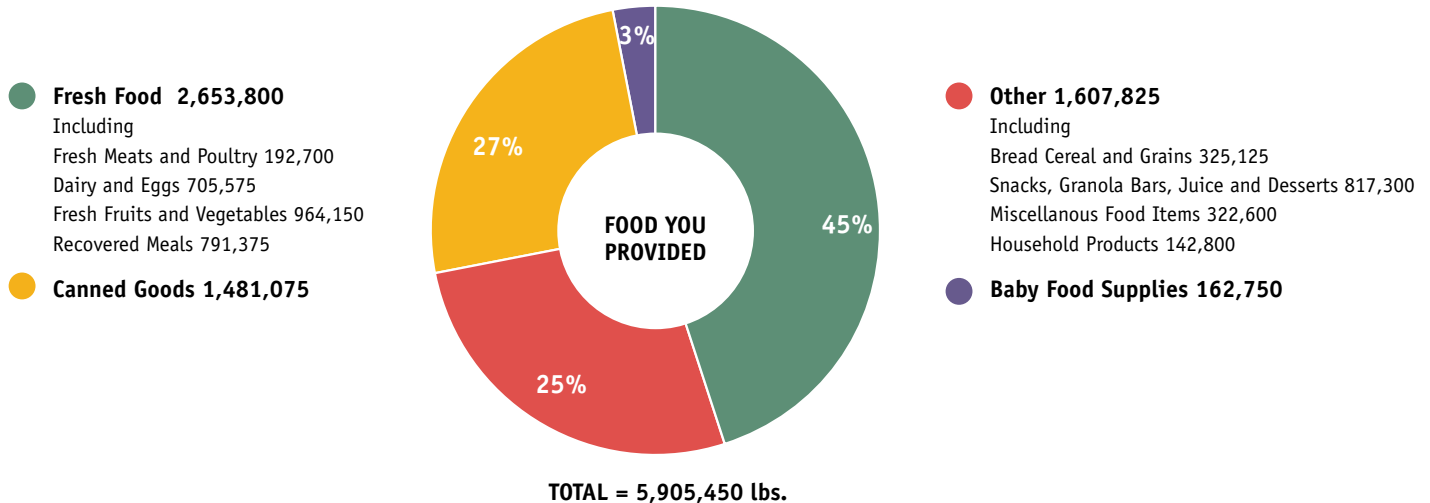
In an effort to continually innovate and improve our services, the Ottawa Food Bank has started a large food recovery pilot project with three Metro locations across the city. The food recovered from this project specifically targets the protein requirements for our meal programs.

With additional increased food recovery demand from numerous vendors, the Ottawa Food Bank is taking steps toward implementing a routing software program to help keep the transportation department as efficient as possible.

Another new implementation to improve our operations and efficiency is software and hardware that will be provided by Kinaxis. This programming is a value-added addition to our already existing inventory management system.

For the 2015 – 2016 fiscal year, the Ottawa Food Bank was responsible for helping to provide food for over 41,500 people per month. The organization responded to this need by distributing \$8,070,944 worth of donated food and \$1,276,240 of purchased food. The items provided to people in need were broken down in distribution as laid out below.

SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONDENSED): FISCAL YEAR 2015-2016

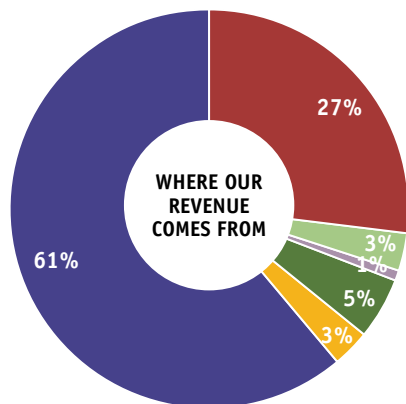
The Ottawa Food Bank takes great care to ensure that we manage our resources with integrity and due diligence. Without our generous community, we simply could not help the tens of thousands of people who turn to some form of emergency food support every month. The majority of funding was allocated to our charitable programs with 85% of total expenses spent on food purchases and distribution, community programs, and operating costs while general administrative and fundraising costs were 5% and 10% respectively.

As we have done over the past two years, the surplus from 2015-2016 is being placed in an operational reserve. As part of our fiscal management strategy, we are creating a six-month operating reserve to ensure that the Ottawa Food Bank can continue to serve our community despite any financial challenges.

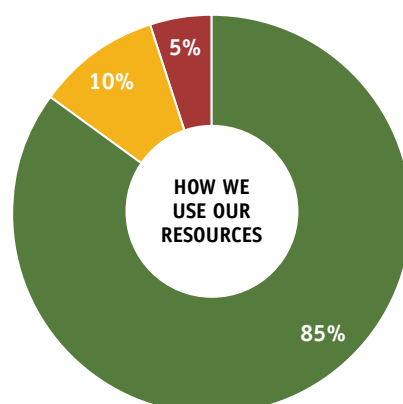

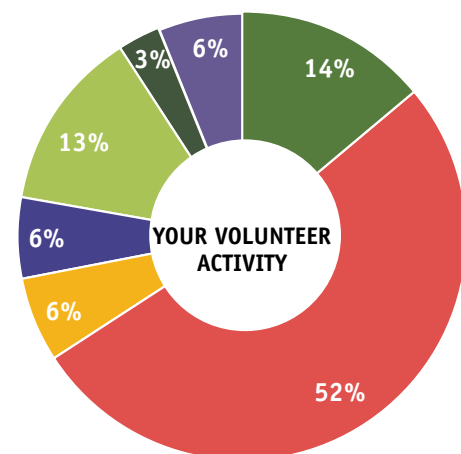
