

Gloucester Emergency Food Cupboard



Since their founding in 1989, the Gloucester Emergency Food Cupboard (GEFC) has been a critical part of the social infrastructure in east Ottawa, providing up to 3,600 residents a year with emergency food.

In order to create a more equitable future for everyone in Ottawa, **we need leaders who will prioritize ending food insecurity**.

In July 2018, the Ottawa Food Bank and its network reported **18,553** visits to community and emergency food banks across the city. In July 2022, there were **28,449**.

This represents an increase in need of 54%.

We are extremely concerned about the impacts of poverty on our community - a combination of low income, precarious work and housing, and unaffordability has resulted in a food insecurity crisis in Ottawa.
