



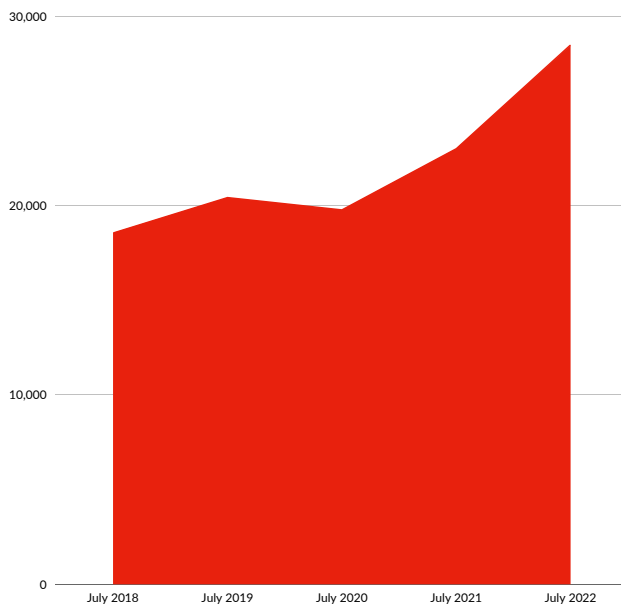
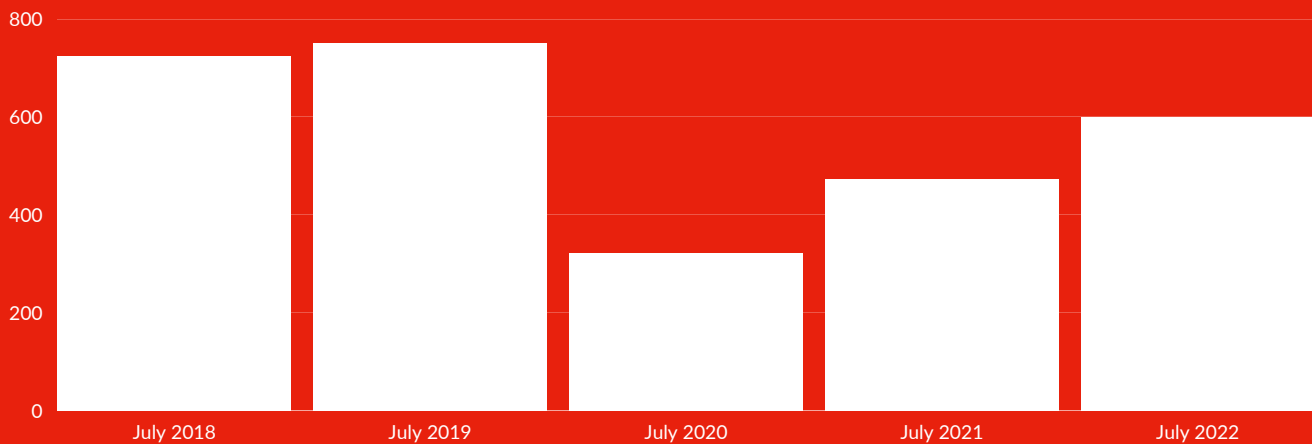
Ottawa Food Bank

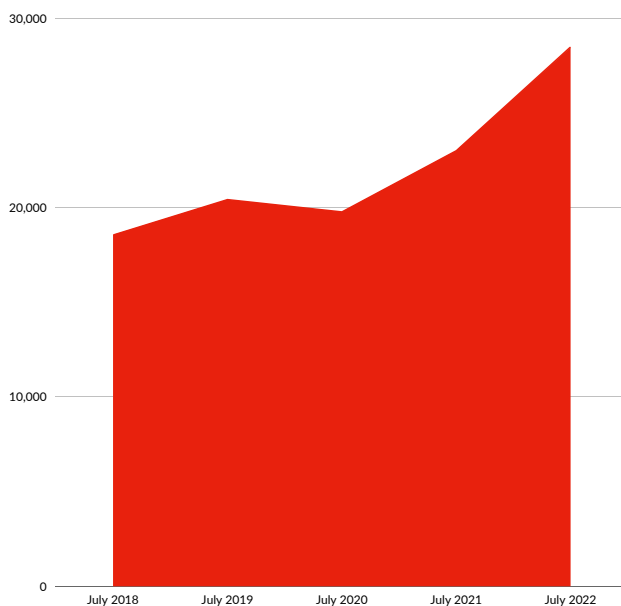
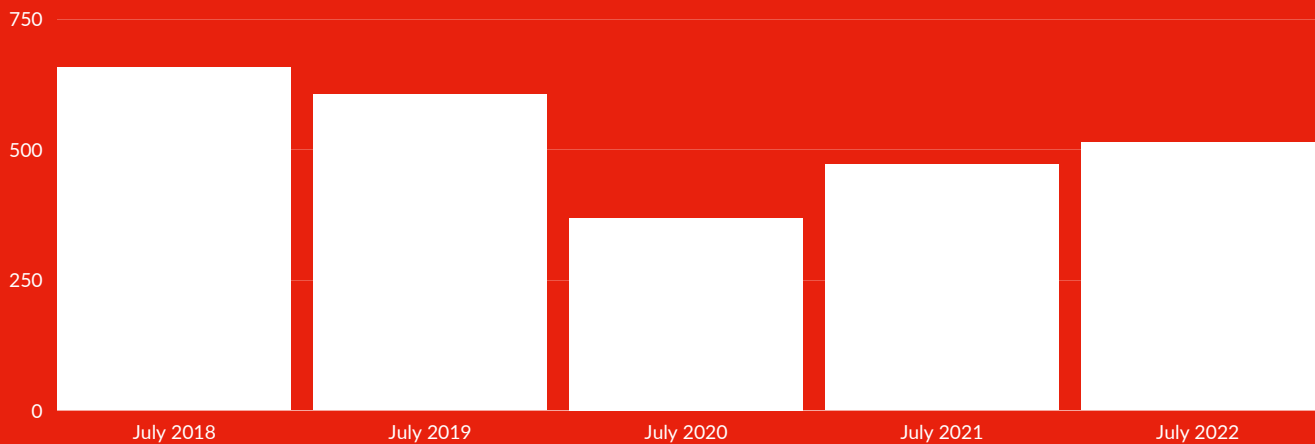


Ottawa Food Bank
