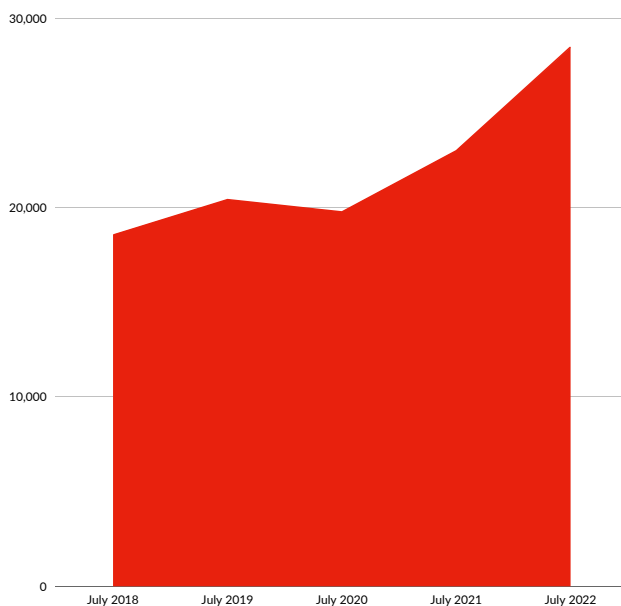
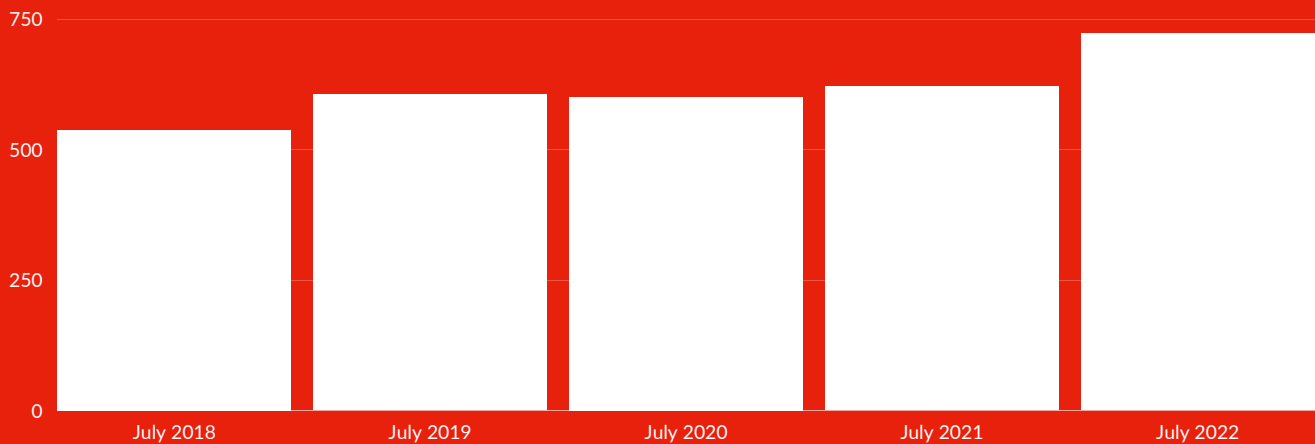


Ottawa Food Bank

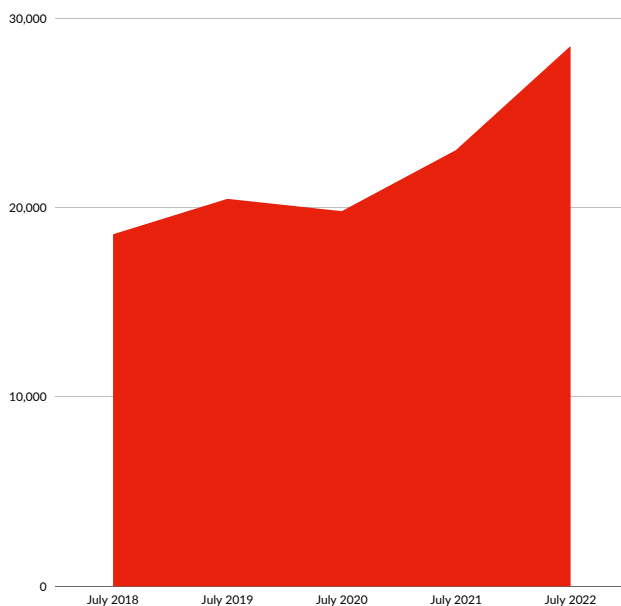
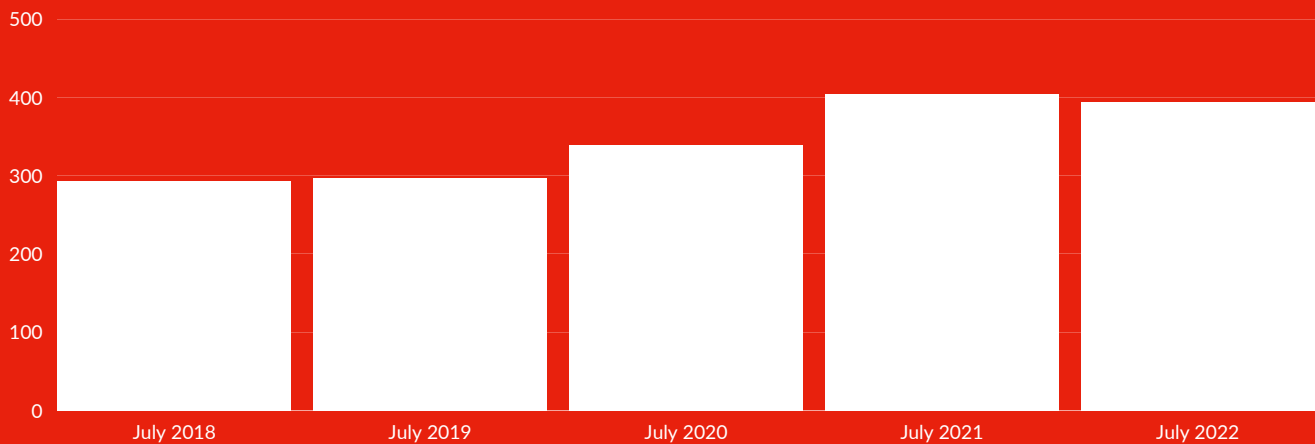
